Dear friends,

I write this during the week when it's been revealed that, for the first time in Scotland's Census, a majority of people said that they had no religion. A total of 51.1% in Scotland's Census 2022 responded "no religion" – up from 36.7% in 2011. This is hardly shocking news, and feeds into the narrative of church decline which has been part of our national landscape for quite some time now.



And yet, alongside this, there may be something else stirring. In recent times some commentators have noted the "surprising rebirth of belief in God." Admittedly those writing about this phenomenon are writing in general terms and are not usually engaging with our Scottish context. Nevertheless, it's worth paying attention, just as we pay attention to other changes in patterns of belief which aren't specifically related to Scotland.

Inevitably the surprising rebirth of belief has had a celebrity focus. Comedian and actor Russell Brand has made headlines for all sorts of reasons, some of them unsavoury to put it mildly. A few weeks ago, he posted a photo of himself being baptised in the River Thames with Bear Grylls taking part. In a video Brand commented that he got baptised after realising that "the material world is not enough" and that chasing material pleasure has left him "cold" and "wanting more". He said his baptism was an act of "surrender, undertaken in gratitude and in sincerity".

Unsurprisingly, given his past, there has been a mixed reaction to Brand's baptism. For me it is once again a reminder of what a relief it is to be able to say that only God can know people's hearts. It is also

another sign that when it comes to belief there may indeed be something in the water (if you'll excuse an awful pun).

Russell Brand is not an isolated figure, either embracing the Christian faith, or at least openly questioning previous unbelief. Even the godfather of the New Atheism movement — Richard Dawkins — has spoken recently about the value of cultural Christianity, even though he maintains his belief that there is no God. I have often spoken about how the historian Tom Holland has reminded secular humanists that their beliefs in human rights, freedom and many of the other values cherished in liberal societies had their roots in the Christian faith.

Aayan Hirsi Ali is a Somali-born American activist, writer and politician who is known for her views critical of Islam and supportive of women's rights. For years she was an outspoken atheist but recently she has said that she is now a Christian, stating that "Atheism failed to answer a simple question: What is the meaning and purpose of life?" There are many other prominent examples of people at least exploring faith in Jesus.

So, what does this mean for us as followers of Jesus? Firstly, it reminds us that God is at work through His Holy Spirit. Amidst the decline of the church in the west it is possible to grow despondent and to wonder if we have got it all wrong. The slight shift in the culture may help us to lift our gaze and to trust in God.

It should also give us confidence that we have a great story to tell. People continue to seek meaning in their lives. Our secular materialistic culture has proposed all sorts of alternative sources of meaning but many people are finding these inadequate. That gives us an opportunity to Jesus who declares "I am the way, the truth and the life."

It should also encourage us to pray for friends and family. God doesn't work among the rich and famous — in fact Scripture and our life experience show us that this is the group who tend to resist the Good News of Jesus more vehemently. The stories emerging of people wanting to find out more about Jesus should encourage us not to give up on our loved ones who show no sign of turning to Jesus.

Only time will tell whether there is a genuine shift in our culture. Regardless of whether this is a turning point, or a blip in the road of increased secularisation, God is not dead but is still at work in the lives of all sorts of people. We all have our own stories to tell of how He is at work in our lives and our prayer should be that He will give us confidence in telling these stories.

Kirk Session

Meeting notes from Wednesday 17th April 2024

Please note, there is another Kirk Session meeting on Wednesday 12th June, some of the points from the April meeting may have been actioned or may have developed by the time you are reading this update.

Matters Arising

> CAP - Christian Against Poverty

The Session has been investigation working with this organisation. Money Matters had welcomed the potential for another debt support group to be working in the area, and contact was still to be made with CAB. After discussion, the decision was taken to see if the matter had progressed any further and review at the June meeting.

Easter Services

There was discussion about the Easter services, it was acknowledged that while some people were away, there were lots of people still about, with over 110 attending Messy Communion on Good Friday which was great. Our Easter services were at Stonelaw Church. There was positive feedback on the Reflective space. Songs of Praise on the afternoon of Easter Sunday was also a very positive experience with many coming who might not have managed to a morning service.

Strategy

Some work has been done on this ongoing issue, eg the gazebo has been taken away, but the tables are still there for young people. William had and has been asking families for feedback which has been positive, there

was other good feedback from a visitor about us being a child friendly church, but we acknowledge there is always room for development. There was discussion about provision of banners and how they enhance worship and what can be done in the future to perhaps create some new banners.

Worship and Prayer

The Session spent some time in groups talking about three areas, and then praying together for these areas – something we were grateful for, something we would like prayer for and something we would like to pray for, for our church. This was an opportunity to share and build relationships.

Summer Ministry

There was discussion on a variety of areas for over the summer. Jonathan will be leading the services on the first three Sundays. Andy reported the plan to create a pack for the children and young people to use with parents during the services. The creche is a space that could be used by children and families. There will be one Fun Friday, there is no date yet, this will be based on availability of those able to help. There will be a Joint Cluster Holiday Club, date tbc. There will be more discussion at the June meeting.

The Kirk Session

Safeguarding

Gary pointed Elders to the Safeguarding report regarding the livestreaming of services. There was discussion around the importance of emphasising there is livestreaming, so people can make a decision about where to sit. William highlighted that the specifics of these issues are for the Safeguarding panel and those who work with children, but it

is important that Session is aware of them and to direct any questions to the panel.

Presbytery Elder

Leigh thanked Chris Mackintosh for his service as our Presbytery Elder. She asked if anyone else felt able to take on this role, to let her know by the June meeting.

Team Reports

World Church

Alan Thomson spoke about the World Church Team's request that permission be given for ourselves and Release International to host the play 'If Prison Walls Could Talk' — on the persecuted church. This is by the Artless theatre company and is a challenging play to watch. However, those who had seen it, felt it was an important play for others to see. After discussion a vote was taken and the majority supported the request. This is expected to happen on **Sunday 6th October**, in the evening.

Communication

Lesley spoke to the update paper that had been circulated. She encouraged Elders, if they are visiting someone who gets the printed version of Contact, to show them pictures on their phone, due to the difficulty in getting photographs of the specific quality, for printing. 75% of those getting the email updates, open them which is positive.

She promoted the podcast and acknowledged the work that John MacLean puts into this. We are still looking for someone to help with work in the church office, and Lesley acknowledged all that Eleanor Crawford does in this area. There was discussion over WiFi provision for the whole of the church building.

Property

Gary summarised the report, and highlighted that work on the dampness is due to begin in May.

A quote for a wooden fence has been received, although it may be preferable for a metal fence to tie in with the existing metal work.

Blairbeth Building

We await a decision by the General Trustees to put Blairbeth on the market, in its current condition.

Presbytery Mission Plan- Request to Review Decision

Our case was rejected by the Review panel. It was highlighted that while the preferred linkage was not imposed, change could be imposed if Neil Watson or William stepped down, it is important to remember this, although we are limited in what action we might take at the moment.

Finance Update

Income

Offerings – Offerings totalled £94,802 – 4.2% more than last year but 6.2% below plan.

As noted in previous issues, it is important that the Local Mission Fund and Missionary Partners Fund are self-sufficient.

- Offerings to the General Fund are higher than last year -7.3%/£4,169. This is needed as our cost base increases, particularly our heat and light costs due to the previous contract coming to an end and the new one kicking in at a higher unit cost.

Other Income

- £4,825 vs £5,890 last year.
 - We continue to enjoy the rental income from 11 Church Avenue and the overall decrease vs last year is due to a decrease in one off donations.

Expenditure

Overall, it totals £130,504 vs £125,373 (4.1%/£5,131) and helpfully just below plan (0.3%/£362).

- Our central church costs (121 and Presbytery) are £40,953 vs £40,310 last year.
- Our biggest year on year cost increase comes from our heat and light with the cost for the first 4 months being £12,904 vs £7,873 last year.

Fund Position

- ➤ The General Fund has a deficit of £7,530 vs last year of £5,993 and assuming the trend continues, we will have a deficit of around £25,000 £30,000 this year.
- Deficit in Local Mission Fund is currently £504 vs £1,363 last year. Please continue to pray for the work that is carried out and supported by this fund.
- Missionary Partner Fund has a deficit of £683. We have a retiring offering after our June communion service. There will be a plate at the door or bank transfers can be made to the church account. For anyone making a cash offering, please can I encourage you to use the envelopes provided so that we can claim the gift aid.

Overall, the deficit is currently £8,717 vs £6,709 last year.

Pastoral Brunch - Croissants Galore!

On Saturday 11 May, 35 of us met for a morning of celebration and discussion around how we can become even better at caring for all ages and stages in our church family. It was a wonderful mix – the youngest was still in their first decade while the eldest was in their



ninth. Some had been involved in pastoral care for many years while others were just starting and wanting to learn. Around half of them were elders, but all were enthusiastic about loving and serving our congregation.



We started by recognising that there are always going to be tensions when we start talking about pastoral care. We have to deal with constant change – in the congregation, in the needs among our members, and in our capacity to serve – and we all have our own expectations of how it "should" work. While the elders have pastoral responsibility to make sure it happens, we all have a role to play in caring for each other. But despite those tensions, there is

so much to celebrate, share and learn from all that is currently happening in our church.

We spent most of the morning discussing a range of topics in small groups, moving round so that we all got a chance to talk to each other. Some of the topics and questions we tackled were:-

- Lamentations In hard times Christ is there. How can we be there too? If you have been through hard times how were you supported by your church? What would have helped more?
- **Communication** is about building relationships with each other in our church family.
- Who do we communicate with in our church family? Do we mostly talk to the people we know well? How would you start a discussion with someone you don't know very well?
- **Welcoming & Including** When you first arrived (no matter how long ago that was) what made you want to stay? What makes a good welcome to church?

It was a very fruitful day, listening to and learning from each other while we recognised and celebrated all the different forms that pastoral care can take. There were many suggestions for how we build and extend our relationships within the church family even more and these will be reported to the Session, with some suggestions for what happens next.

Two things are planned as a follow up from this event:-

• A **summer book group** reading "Side By Side" by Edward Welch. This is a simple but profound book which takes the ordinary things we say to each other, shows us how important they are and how we can build on them to draw us all closer in wisdom and love. This will take place on-line, so you can take part no matter where you are.



 A similar discussion event after the summer – many who would have liked to attend were busy that day and there are hopefully many others who would like to take part in a morning of sharing and discussion, continuing our growth as a sharing and caring congregation.

Union – Summer Camp

Kings Cross (KX1), Arran

We are in the preparation stage of planning for KX1 again this year. This is the Scripture Union Scotland Holiday run by Ross Murray and Alison Kennedy at Kingscross campsite in



Arran. This is open for young people in P5 to S2 and mostly from the local area although there are some booked in that come from further away.

We have a really strong team this year with lots of enthusiastic trainee and young leaders which is excellent and we have a lot of returning leaders from previous years too. At the moment we have 20 young people booked in which is a smaller number than previous years, but this can also have advantages like being able to create a family feel faster than a bigger camp and logistically makes planning groups, pods, travel groups easier too.

The theme for the year is Cinema and the teaching is going to be based on different movie genres everyday and covering different people such as Daniel, Ruth, Noah and Jonah and how we can live for God in today's world.

Prayer points:

- ➤ Travel the last few years there have been quite a few travel disruptions due to the weather and Calmac's ferries (team travel on the 29th June and young people arrive on 30th June, we all come home on 5th July)
- ➤ Safety we are a mostly outside camp with lots of different activities including gorge walking and travelling around Arran so safety in all these things
- ➢ God's presence that we can all feel God's presence on the beautiful location and while we are doing activities as well as bible teaching time
- The Team Ross and Alison are leading the camp, Amy and David are in charge of the day to day running of camp, Andy and Steph are planning and leading teaching times, the kitchen team, group leaders and trainees, the general helpers and Isaac. Everyone has something to prepare before camp



whether it be the teaching, programme or organising a game or activity.

➤ **Weather** – we are mostly outside and we rely on dry weather to be able to run lots of the activities.

On behalf of the Management Committee of the Reachout Trust I want to express our grateful thanks to the congregation for your support during the past year and in particular to thank you for the financial contribution from the Church.

The annual support from the congregation at Burnside Blairbeth is greatly appreciated as Reachout seeks to reach out and support children and young folk in our area.

Financial position

For the interest of the church fellowship please note that for the financial year to 31 March 2024 Reachout's income was aligned with our expenditure as we reported a small surplus of £253 for the year.

However, during the past year our second Youth and Schools Worker, Andrew McAlees, left Reachout for another position with his own church. In addition, our Administration Assistant. Greg Senior, moved on from Reachout after a number of years supporting the Trust. We are delighted that Shona Baird, from Stonelaw Church, was appointed in March to succeed Greg as our Administration Assistant.

We are still seeking to recruit the second Youth and Schools Worker in order that Ross Murray is supported fully in the day to day work of Reachout. We are currently re-advertising for this position, and it is hoped that interviews will take place during the month of June.

Once this position is filled, during the coming financial year to March 2025 we will need to increase our income base. As a result, in addition to the donations received from individuals and the local churches, which form the foundation of Reachout's income base, we will also be aiming to secure additional funding from grant awarding bodies with a view to specifically aiming to procure grants to produce income over a three year period and thereby ensure the security of employment for the staff going forward.

The Management Committee would greatly appreciate your prayers for the work of Reachout at this time, not least for the recruitment of a suitable replacement for Andrew, but also for Reachout's finances going forward.

30 Years of Reachout

Reachout was created by the local churches in Cambuslang and Rutherglen in 1994 and later this year we will celebrate the Trust's 30th anniversary. We give thanks to God for His faithfulness and provision during these past 30 years as Reachout has sought and continues to seek to engage with and support our local young people in increasing their understanding of the Christian faith, exploring the Bible, and putting their faith into action. We will be celebrating the anniversary on **Saturday 26 October** – a date to put in your diary.

Reachout Update & Prayer Requests

Reachout is currently involved in two projects, 'It's your move' and 'Buddy-up'. Both these projects are being delivered to all of the primary schools in the Rutherglen and Cambuslang area and so far are going very well.
